Emergent Public Health Issues in the US-Mexico Border Region Cecilia Ballesteros Rosales 2017-02-16 US-Mexico border region area has unique social, demographic and policy forces at work that shape the health of its residents as well as serves as a microcosm of migration health challenges facing an increasingly mobile and globalized world. This region reflects the largest migratory flow between any two nations in the world.
